Foods that are not kept cold at proper temperatures can become contaminated. In addition, cross-contamination can occur if meat products are not handled correctly. It is important to keep meat separate from other foods during the preparation process. After handling the meat, the FDA recommends rubbing your hands with warm soapy water for 20 seconds.
